In 1982, the Center became a State institution and was renamed the Regional Institute for Children and Adolescents — Cheltenham (Chapter 891, Acts of 1982). It serves severely emotionally disturbed boys and girls, ages 12 to 18 years old, from Prince George's, St. Mary's, Calvert, and Charles counties.

Most of the young people at the Institute reside there. The average length of stay is eight months. Some are day students who receive therapy and schooling at the Institute but live at home. The Institute's 40 residential beds include 5 for students referred by the court for evaluation.
