The Program also undertakes ice breaking and dredging, and constructs regional boating facilities and local small-boat launching ramps, piers, and ancillary facilities.

The Operations Program is responsible for State-owned marinas and vessels.

The State maintains two public marinas. At Crisfield, Somers Cove Marina is the home of the Annual Crab Derby. Ft. Washington Marina is located at Piscataway Bay off the Potomac River.

The Program maintains three State-owned vessels and schedules their use. They include the Governor's yacht Independence; a management work boat Declaration, used to assist Chesapeake Bay projects and scientific research; and the Anna McGarvey, the State Skipjack designed for educational purposes to promote the heritage and restoration of Chesapeake Bay.
