than ten dollars, or more than twenty dollars, or be imprisoned in the county jail not exceeding twenty days, or until the payment of said fine and costs, one-half of said fine to be paid to the County Commissioners of said county, for the use of the public schools of said county, and the other half to the informer."

Which was adopted.

Said Bill, as amended, was then read the second time.
