crease the same, and if by increasing, injury should result, then the law as it now is, shall prevail, to the end that no injury be inflicted, and include all other waters of the State.

The Clerk of the House of Delegates delivered the following bill:

A bill entitled an Act to repeal and re-enact with amendments sections 12 and 14, of Article 41, Code of Public General Laws, title "Fish and Fisheries," sub-title "Potomac."

Which was read the first time and referred to Committee on Chesapeake Bay and its Tributaries.

Mr. Henry, from the Committee on the Chesapeake and its Tributaries, to whom the leave was granted, reported a bill entitled an Act repeal the Act passed at January session, 1868, chapter 406, in relation to Oysters, and to reenact the same with amendments.

Which was read the first time and ordered to be printed.
