A bill entitled an Act to repeal section 2, of chapter 31, of the Acts of Assembly of 1865, in relation to the publication of Laws, and to re-enact the same with amendments.

Which was read the first time and referred to the Committee on Judicial Proceedings.

A bill entitled an Act to incorporate the Washington Valley, Hampstead and Baughman Valley Railroad Company.

Which was read the first time and referred to the Committee on Corporations.

A bill entitled an Act to repeal section 6, of chapter 385, of the Act of 1868, entitled an Act to provide by law for taking and perpetuating the evidence of the number of persons held to labor and service, &c., and to substitute in lieu thereof the following.

Which was read the first time and referred to the Committee on Judicial Proceedings.

A bill entitled an Act to repeal the 2d and 3d sections of the Act passed at the January session 1868, chapter 302, entitled an Act to provide for refunding money paid into the Treasury.

Which was read the first time and referred to the Committee on Finance.

A bill entitled an Act to create State Banking Institutions and to enable the several Banks in this State, State and National to avail of the provisions thereof.

Which was read the first time and referred to the Committee on Judicial Proceedings.

A bill entitled an Act to add the following sections to Article 75, of the Code, sub-title "Practice" to come in after section 58.

Which was read the first time and referred to the Committee on Judicial Proceedings.

A bill entitled an Act to amend the Act of 1868, chapter 138, relating to election districts in Charles county by adding an additional section to said Act.

Which was read the first time and referred to the Senators from Charles, Prince George's and Anne Arundel counties.

A bill entitled an Act to repeal section 7, of Article 42, of the Code of Public General Laws, and to re-enact and amend the same by adding a clause authorizing the Governor to remit any part of the time for which any person may be sentenced to confinement in the Penitentiary.
