## CHAPTER 202.

AN ACT to amend and alter the Charter of the City of Annapolis.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That sections thirty, thirty-six, forty, forty-one and forty-nine of Article two of the Code of Public Local Laws of Anne Arundel County, and Section two of the Act entitled an Act to Repealed. amend and alter the Charter of the City of Annapolis, passed on the nineteenth day of March, eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, be and the same Amended. are hereby repealed and the following are substituted in their place.

30. The boundaries of the City of Annapolis shall be as follows: Beginning at the water's edge at Windmill Point, thence by a straight line to Annapolis. Sycamore Point, and thence again by a straight line from Sycamore Point to the wharf at Fort Madison, and thence by a drawn line from the wharf at Fort Madison to the south wall of the Naval Academy, at the eastern terminus of Hanover street, and following the present enclosures of the Naval Academy to the Severn river, at the northeastern terminus of Tabernacle street, thence along the south shore of said river and College creek, to the head of said creek, thence by a straight line from the head of said creek, to the head of Acton's cove or Spa creek, and thence following the northeast of said creek to the place of beginning; and the citizens of Annapolis, qualified to vote for members of the General Assembly vote for Mayor of Maryland, shall, on the first Monday of April, tive officers. in the year eighteen hundred and seventy-one, and every two years thereafter elect by hallot a Mayor, Counsellor, and five Aldermen, who shall constitute the corporation of said city, under the name and style of the Mayor, Counsellor and Aldermen of the City of Annapolis.

56. The Mayor, Counsellor and Aldermen, shall hold their first session in Annapolis on the second Meetings. Monday in April, and shall meet on the second Monday in each month thereafter, but the Mayor may summon them to convene whenever and as often as it may appear to him that the interests of the city require their deliberations, and a majority
