Mr. Kilbourn, acting Chairman of the Committee on Ways and Means, reported favorably,

A bill entitled an Act making appropriations for the support of the Government for the year ending the first day of January 1872.

Which was read a first time.

The hour of 12 o'clock, M., having arrived, being the time agreed upon between the two Houses, to proceed to the election of a Police Commissioner for the City of Baltimore, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Lefevre Jarrett; and to elect a Commissioner for the full term of four years from March, 1871, as required by the Act of Assembly of 1867, chapter 367,

Mr. Sanner submitted the following message:
