AMENDMENTS PROPOSED.

Strike out the first section, and insert the following as section 1 :

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That section 6, of the Act of 1861, entitled "an Act to amend the eighty-third Article of the Code of Public General Laws, by exempting a certain amount of property from execution," be and the same is hereby repealed, and re-enacted so as to read as follows.

Strike out title, and insert the following as title to the bill:

An Act to amend the Act of 1861, chapter 8, relating to exemption of property from execution.
