The House bill entitled an Act to repeal the Act of 1870, chapter 477, entitled an Act to repeal the Act of 1867, chapter 385, which provides for paying pensions to soldiers and widows of deceased soldiers of the war of 1812.

Said bill being upon a third reading,

Mr. Chapman, (by unanimous consent,) submitted the following amendment:

AMENDMENT PROPOSED.

Page 21, in line 51, after the word "circumstances," strike out the words, "and not drawing a pension from the General Government."

The question then recurring upon the adoption of the amendment,

Mr. Chapman demanded the yeas and nays.
