Resolved, by the Mayor and both Branches of the City Council of Baltimore, That it is inexpedient at this time, to increase the weekly pay from \$18 to \$20 of the Metropolitan Police Force, in our City, as is proposed in the bill now before the General Assembly of Maryland, and that our Honorable Senators and Delegates be earnestly requested to vote against, and to use their influence to defeat the same.
