On motion of Mr. Griswold,

Leave was granted to the Committee on the Judiciary to introduce a bill to repeal section 3 of Article XI., of the Code of Public General Laws, entitled "Attorneys-at-Law and Attorneys in fact," and to re-enact the same with an amendment.

Mr. Griswold, Chairman of the Committee on the Judiciary, reported favorably,

The Senate bill, entitled an Act to permit Frederick Charles Edmund Petre, an alien, to hold real estate.

Which was read a second time.

Mr. Miller moved that the bill be read a third time this day, in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution; section 27, Article III.
