

to any merchant, or in loading any ship or vessel with grain, except the proper grain that may have been grown by the said weigher, under the penalty of two dollars for every bushel so bought or sold, and upon conviction for the offence he shall be dismissed from his office.

Not receive any gratuity. SEC. 11. *And be it enacted,* That if any weigher shall accept or receive, directly or indirectly, any gratuity or reward for anything done by him in pursuance hereof, other than what is hereinafter allowed as his compensation, he shall upon conviction forfeit the sum of one thousand dollars, and ever after be incompetent to hold the office of weigher under the laws of this State.

Make daily returns. SEC. 12. *And be it enacted,* That each weigher shall make a daily return to the Weigher General of the number of bushels of grain weighed by him, and the Weigher General shall make or cause to be made an entry of the same in a well bound book, showing the number of bushels weighed and measured for each person, and the said Weigher General shall charge and receive one-fourth cent per bushel for weighing, and shall charge one-fourth cent per bushel for measuring; said one-fourth cent per bushel for measuring shall be paid by the seller to the measurer, and the first named aforesaid one-fourth cent per bushel for weighing shall be paid by the purchaser to the Weigher General.

Weigher General to make returns SEC. 13. *And be it enacted,* That the Weigher General shall make a return on the first day of every month or within ten days thereafter to the Comptroller, verified by affidavit before some Justice of the Peace, of the number of bushels of grain weighed, and the amount of money received therefor, and shall pay the amount thereof after deducting necessary office rent, and the payment of the wages of not more than two clerks, at a salary of not more than six hundred dollars per annum for each, to the Treasurer upon the warrant of the Comptroller.

Compensat'n. SEC. 14. *And be it enacted,* That the Treasurer, upon the warrant of the Comptroller, shall allow and pay over to the Weigher General and the other weighers
