

Leave was granted to the Committee on Corporations to introduce a bill to repeal certain sections of, and amend the charter of, the Old Town Savings Institution of Baltimore.

Mr. Stone submitted Joint Resolutions, requesting our Senators and Representatives in Congress to vote for refunding to the Planters of the Southern States the tax on cotton heretofore paid by them.

A bill, entitled an Act to enable the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore to subscribe to the amount of seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars to the capital stock of the Maryland Central Railroad Company, in the State of Maryland, and a loan to pay such subscription.

Mr. Foster moved that the bill be read a second time, according to the provisions of the Constitution, Section 27, Article 3.
