The humble Petition of John Taylor sheweth that whereas your Petitioner in June Court last past did prefer a petition against John Strawbridge for two hundred pounds of libeas, for taking up his wench, Mary Maxwell, which was run away, but your Petitioner can find no order upon Record for the said two hundred pounds of libeas, which your Petitioner humbly prays Order for the same now againe against the said John Strawbridge, and your Petitioner as in duty bound shall ever pray

John Taylor.

The aforesaid Petition being read it was by this Court considered and ordered that the said John Strawbridge pay the said John Taylor two hundred pounds of libeas as prayed for etc.

Edward Bright being presented by the Jury of Enquiry for Orphan's last June Court concerning the Estate of Richard Bright the said Edward made it appear that he had news of the said Edward's late only an Orphan belonging to the said Richard Bright and therefore was dismissed of Court.

George Comer this day bound before the Court to make his personall appearance before their worships the next Court to be holden the second Tuesday in November 1691. to answer to their Majesties what shall be etc. and therefore came the said George Comer & by interrogatories did confess himself to be indebted to the their Majesties the sum of 10. Sterling and Francis Joyce his Security in the sum of five pounds like money due to be levied on their goods and chattels lands and tenements for their Majesties use etc. The Condition of w. Joynes is such that if the said Comer do make his appearance as aforesaid then the Record be, otherwise to be and remain in full power force and virtue.

In Regard: Woolford Com. sills new in Court.

To their Majesties Justices of the Peace for Somerset County now sitting in Court. The humble petition of Edw. Price humbly sheweth to your worships that Capt. M. Culbourn, sold a woman servant as by writing may appear for the space of two years and therein mentioned to the petition which servant the Petitioner sold to John Brown of Hantsport for the said Term, which servant was afterwards sold from so Brown before the end of the Term by Order of Court, Now so it is that so Brown restored six hundred pounds of the petition for his loss of the said servant. May it therefore please your worships to Order the Heirs of aforesaid Capt. M. Culbourn to repay the said six hundred pounds of libeas to the Petitioner and the Petitioner as bound in duty shall pray etc.

Which being read Capt. M. Culbourn appearing, the Court referred the matter to Mr. Thomas Jones and Mr. Thomas Corndon.

John Brown according to a Summons this day in Court produced a retail of James Stattersby's for 10. of this County shroud, and the said Brown gave acc<sup>t</sup> of 15 which he himself had. Capt. M. Culbourn gave acc<sup>t</sup> of 21. dills which he had, and a retail from Weymouth London for 6. dills Mr. Edward Day gave acc<sup>t</sup> to this Court of twenty five shrouds viz 12 at his own house. Gal. Cap. M. Jones four at Mr. J. Harts 2 Carried away by servants which the said Day assumes to make good, and one Cap. M. Jones Carried away which the Court thinks not fitting to Charge to the said Day's account.
