 - poy hundred within the Jurisdiction of this Court sometime in the month of October last past not having the fear of God before his eyes but instigated
 and assisted by his devil at his house or shoppe. Lays in his forechamber, did with malice and shamefully allured
 about & entice one Margaret Edmunds of this County spinster with profane and uncleanly ministrations
 his words, and further proceeded to horridous & unseemly actions spending his privities to her said
 woman's view, and finding that the said Margaret was alone and none to redire her and advise her die violently
 lay hands on her and throw her downe, and for God's most insolent and inhumanity abusid and what in him
 the said Oxford did lay endeavoured to staine a Rape upon her body, until the said Margaret's shreves and
 custodie bring some sound of a person unknowne to his house to her assistance. whereupon the said Oxford
 was notwithstanding to desist from his promeditated and intended villainy. Now their Maiesties Attorney General
 saith that the said Oxford being so wicked and shamefull as to violate Gods laws of God and man, abusing
 his own body, and endeavouring a Rape upon the body of the said Margaret wife shamefull & unlawfull
 but, ought to suffer his paines and punishments due to such attempt, being taken in his offend intended
 it, since the Law Maxim: In dubio puniter non securer est & lass, points at the very same (act) in all its
 circumstances. Therefore heres present may be rebuked agaynt the Oxford according to law in that case in

The above said Plaintiff being read in Court to which the said Oxford pleaded not guilty and for his
 to call put him selfe upon the Country. whereon Command was given to the Sheriff to summon twelve
 good and lawfull men of his neighborhood, that the matter in question might be better understood
 and forthwith the Sheriff made a retorne of twelve or pauncel of Jury men whose names are as follows:
 viz: Richard Chamberlaine. Walter Taylor. John Colhoun. John Broughton. Matthew Penman. William
 Simmon Thomas. Ell. Benjamin Gards. William Palmer Junr. John Painter. Michael William
 Richard. Butterton, who being lawfully summoned and sworn, having heard the aforesd Judgement, and also
 the Oathes of two witnesses, as also the examination of those evidences, with two depositions herein
 negatived.

The deposition of Margaret Edmunds aged about twenty one years the Deponent saith that upon the
 19th day of October last past came into the house of Mr Stephen Page and his wife Anne in Attmore. Chur
 ch Oxford, who brought in his hand a Bulleys pistol, with intent to struff the Deponent on her back. Replying
 that no Master ^{or dame} that ever she had, did ever strike her wife but a way in, and upon those words a youth
 his name among the said Oxford who had no better pistol than that, the said Oxford answered that
 he had and took out his private members before all his family then in the house saying look you here is
 a better pistol, how is a fine thing, he the said Oxford then laid violent hands on the said Deponent, then set
 took some thair, then took me in his arms, and threw me upon Mr Pages bed, there in struggling with me he
 down the curtains, got his hand to what I could up my naked body, & trying to pull me desist in his bed wherein
 telling him that he would acquit Mr Page, now he intended to desy to his God, he replyed that if Mr. P.
 Page would pay me for the C. of in the life time of her calling to Elizabeth Lawrence witness
