sixteen wards; and when it shall have increased to one hundred and CHAP. 14& sixty thousand, the said-city shall be divided into eighteen wards; and when it shall have increased to two hundred thou-and, the said city shall be divided into twenty wards; and it shall be the duty of the corporation to correct the divisions from time to time, so as to preserve, as accurately as may be, an equal number of inhabitants in each ward.

2. And he it enacted. That the annual session of the city Annual session council of Baltimore shall hereafter commence on the first Monday Quorum-Appendication of January, two thirds of each branch shall be a quorum to do inchincers siness; and all persons holding offices under the corporation of the said city, shall, unless otherwise provided by acts of assembly, or by ordinances of the city, be understood to hold such offices during the pleasure of the mayor; and the mayor of the city shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of a convent on of the two branches of the city council, shall appoint all officers under the corporation, except the register of the city, and the clerks emplayed by the city, or under their authorite; the register shall be appointed by a convention of the two branches of the city council, biennially; to be commissioned by the mayor, removable nevertheless, at picasure, by a convention of the said two branches; but vacancies in office happening in the recess of the sessions shall be filled as beretofore.

3. AND BE IT ENACTED. That from and after the thirtieth day Electors of mayor of September next, the number of electors of Mayor shall be the to be equal to same as the number of wards in the city; and for the purpose of "Baints accomplishing more effectively the state of the purpose of "Baints" accomplishing more effectually the objects intended by t e act*, en- *Nov. 1812, ch 194 titled. As act providing for the appointment of bailiffs for the ${\rm Gy}$ of Baltimore, the bailiffs of the said city, whose appointment shall be made in the manner of other city officers, and whose number shall not be less than five, may exercise all the powers, be entitled to all the empluments, and shall perform all the duties of constables, within the limits of the city, provided that they shall first take the oaths, and execute the bonds, (with security satisfactory to the mayor,) which are prescribed by law for constables.

4. AND BE IT ENACTED, That the mayor and city council of Direct taxes Baltimore shall have power to lay and collect direct taxes on the assessments of private property within the city, to such amount as shall be thought necessary for the public or city purposes; and may enforce the collection of all dues and impositions, (except fines, penalties and torfeitures,) in the same manner as is now provided with respect to city taxes; and tenants in possession shall be liable to the payment of taxes imposed upon premises occupied by them, welfoat its operating, however, to alter the nature of contracts between landlords and tenants.

5. And BE IT ENACTED. That in case any person, called upon Person refusing to to pay any tax, due or imposition, levied or imposed by the said proceeded against corporation, shall deny their right to impose or collect the same, the collector shall not proceed to enforce the payment thereof, by distress and sale of the party's goods, provided such person shall, before the time of such distress or sale of goods distrained therefor, go before a justice of the peace within the city, and with one good security, resident of the city and satisfactory to the justice, and shall confess judgment to the mayor and city council of Baltimore, in double, the sum demanded, with a condition annexed to the certificate of the confession of adgment, that if the said mayor and
