

8. Order for paying all Charges, occasioned by the Disturbance of Capt. Josias Fendall, by a public Levy.
9. Order appointing a Committee, to call all persons to account, who have received fines amerced on the late disturbers of the public peace.
10. Leave to the Inhabitants to employ Indians, for the destroying of Wolves.
11. The two Serjeants to be Levy free.
12. Order for payment of all just demands for killing Wolves in St. Mary's County.
13. Order for assessing 32lb. Tobacco per Poll, for payment of public Charges.

Confirmed among the perpetual Laws, by 1676, ch. 2.

CHAP. IV.

For 3 years, &c. Continued by various reviving acts, till repealed by 1676, ch. 2.

CHAP. V.

An act concerning a Register of Births, Marriages and Burials. Lib. WH. fol. 14.

For 3 years, &c. Continued by several reviving acts till its repeal by 1678, ch. 10.

CHAP. VI.

An concerning Servants that have Bastards.

For 3 years, &c. A new law made 1652, ch. 4. Expired.
