## CHAP. XXV.

Passed Feb 1474 The humble petition of Jacob Duhattoway, Anthony Brispoë, and Peter Achillis, all resident and inhabiting within this Province, Lib. C and WH. fol. 252. and Lib. WH and L. fol. 93.

A Private Act. Viz. For Naturalization.

## CHAP. XXVI.

Ditto, An act concerning what shall be allowed to the Grand Juries that are summoned twice a year, out of the body of the Province, to attend Provincial Courts. Lib. C and WH. fol. 253. Lib. WH. fol. 110. and Lib. WH and L. fol. 94.

For 3 years, &c. Expired in 1692, after successive revivals. A new law made 1692, ch. 48.

## CHAP. XXVII.

Ditto An act for the raising a present supply for his Excellency the Captain-General, to defray the charge of making peace with the Seneca Indians, and making war with the Susquehannah Indians and their confederates, if occasion requires. Repealed by 1676, ch. 2.

## CHAP. XXVIII.

Ditto An act empowering the Governor and Council to levy the charge for making war or peace with the Indians. Repealed by 1676, ch. 2.

## CHAP. XXIX.

Ditto An act for reviving certain laws within this Province. Repealed by 1676, ch. 2.

## CHAP. XXX.

Ditto An act for payment and assessing the public charge of this Province. Repealed by 1676, ch. 2.

## CHAP. XXXI.

Ditto An act for the regulation of Attorneys fees. Repealed by 1676, ch. 2.

1676 Acts made at a General Assembly held at the City of St. Mary's the 15th May, in the first year of the Dominion of the Right Honourable Charles, &c. Annoq. Domini 1676, and ended the 15th day of June following.

## CHAP. I.

Passed 15th June 1676. An act for reviving of certain laws within this Province. Lib. WH. fol. 1.

By this act the following laws were revived, and continued in force for 3 years, or to the end of the next session of Assembly, which should first happen, viz. 1658, ch. 5. 1661, ch. 2, 3, and 5. 1662, ch. 1, and 3. 1663, ch. 1, and 2. 1666, ch. 1. 1669, ch. 2, 3, 5, and 7. 1671, ch. 4, 7, 8, 9, 23, 25, and 30. 1674, ch. 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 9, 13, 22, and 26. Repealed by 1678, ch. 16.
