RESOLVED, That Benjamin Harwood, trustee of the state be, and Passed Dec 13 Stock to be transhe is hereby authorised and directed, to transfer the amount of thir. lerred ty thousand dollars of the six per cent. stock of the United States, to the president and directors of the Potomac Company, upon their pledging the funds of said company, and upon the president and directors giving bond with such security as the treasurer may approve of for the reimbursement of the principal in instalments of three four and five years, with interest upon the whole amount of principal from the date of the transfer and the payment of such interest annually.
