the memorialists have therefore humbly prayed that they may be empowered to CHAP. convey the trust aforesaid to the trustees of the poor of Talbot county, and their fuccessors, for the use and benefit of the poor of said county: And whereas it feemeth reasonable to this general assembly to grant the prayer of the said memorialists;

XXIV.

II. Be it enacted, by the general assembly of Maryland, That Matthew Tilgh- Trustees auman and John Gordon, trustees as aforesaid of the aforesaid charity school in thorical to convey, &c. Saint Peter's parish, in Talbot county aforesaid, shall be and are hereby authorised and empowered to convey in fee-simple the aforesaid lands unto the said trustees of the poor of Talbot county, and their successors, for the charitable use and benefit of the poor of faid county, and that fuch deed, being executed and acknowledged in the usual form, and recorded amongst the records of Talbot county, shall be good and sufficient to convey the said land to the said trustees, and their successors, for the use aforesaid.

III. Provided always, That nothing in this act is meant, or shall be constru- Provide. ed to affect the right of any person whatever, except those mentioned in this act.

IV. Be it enafted, That that part of an act of assembly, passed at November Part of an act fession, seventeen hundred and eighty-five, entitled, An act for the relief of the repealed. poor of Talbot county, empowering the justices of said county to affess and levy on the property of faid county the fum of four hundred pounds in the years feventeen hundred and eighty-seven and seventeen hundred and eighty-eight, be and hereby is repealed.

## H A P. XXV.

An ACT declaring the treaty of peace between the United States Paffed May and his Britannic majesty the supreme law within this state.

E it enacted, by the general affembly of Maryland, and it is hereby declared, Treaty the That the treaty of peace made between the United States of America and &c. I his Britannic majesty, is the supreme law within this state, and shall be so confidered and adjudged in all courts of law and equity; and all causes and queftions, cognizable by the faid courts respectively, ought and shall be determined according to the faid treaty, and the tenor, true intent and meaning thereof.

XXVI. C H A P.

An ACT for the relief of Belain Posey.

THEREAS Belain Posey, of Charles county, hath, by his petition, fet forth to the general affembly of Maryland, that some time ago he purchased from a certain George Crane of the said county, one hundred and ten acres of a tract of land lying in the faid county, called Crane's Low-Grounds, and paid for the same a consideration equal to the value thereof, upon a supposition and belief that the said George Crane was entitled to it as heir in tail to his father, a certain John Crane, to whom it had been devised in tail by another John Crane, father to the devisee; that the said land, by virtue of the devise, had continued in possession of the family, and that the said George was possessed of it at the time of the said purchase; that since the said purchase, the faid Belain Posey, understanding that a third John Crane, (elder son to the devisee, and brother to George Crane) who left the state many years ago, and had not since been heard of, was still alive, and that as the said John Crane is an alien to the state of Maryland, the true legal right to the land was in the state during the continuance of the iffue in tail, that he the said Belain Posey, to prevent any other person from procuring that property, to which he conceived himfelf in equity entitled, made discovery of it as confiscated property, and, in consequence of an agreement with the state's agent, passed his bond to the state for the sum of one hundred pounds, as a consideration for the state's right: And whereas it appears by the faid petition, that the faid Belain Posey, whilst commanding a company in the service of this state, in the year seventeen hundred and feventy-fix, was robbed of one hundred and eighty-four pounds fifteen shillings
