<sup>1</sup>A total of 33 votes against the proposed constitution was not counted because voters refused to take a loyalty oath – 15 in Howard County, 10 in Montgomery County and 8 in Baltimore City. A total of 61 votes were cast and recorded as "blank" in Dorchester (2), Frederick (23), Harford (19), Montgomery (14), Queen Anne's (2) and Worcester (1) counties.

<sup>2</sup>A total of 27 votes was cast and recorded as "blank" in Baltimore City (1) and the counties of Baltimore (9), Carroll (1), Cecil (1), Frederick (3), Montgomery (2), Prince George's (4), Queen Anne's (2) and St. Mary's (4).

<sup>3</sup>Garrett County was a part of Allegany County in 1864 and 1868.

<sup>4</sup>Wicomico County was a part of Somerset and Worcester Counties in 1864 and 1868.

<sup>5</sup>The Union soldiers vote was taken by military unit with varying methods, including *vis a voce*, used in counting. Without this unusual vote the 1864 Constitution would have failed by 1,975 votes (29,536 to 27,541).
