MISCELLANEA

In keeping with the national trend, the Republicans won all counties in Maryland, losing only Baltimore City to the Democrats. Following the Watergate scandal, Nixon resigned on August 9, 1974. Gerald Ford succeeded to the Presidency, becoming the first President to attain that office without election. Former Governor of New York, Nelson A. Rockefeller was chosen as Vice President. The President and Vice President were both appointed rather than elected.
