Be it remembered and it hereby certified that we the undersigned James E. Hooper, Henry M. McCollough Robert W. Meade Albert E. Orr, Henry Mount, Adam C. King, J. Frank Parra and Abram G. Thomas, who have been duly appointed Electors of President and Vice-President of the United States of America for the next ensuing regular term of the respective offices thence, beginning from and after the third day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and one, being Electors duly appointed by the State of Maryland, in the manner directed by the Legislature of said State as will appear by the Certificate of the Honorable John Walter Smith the Governor of Maryland, and under the Great Seal of the State, hereunto annexed.

We meet on the second Monday, being the fourteenth day of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and one at the hour of noon, in the State House, in the City of Annapolis, in the said State being the time and place appointed for such meeting by the Laws of the United States and of the State of Maryland, and that we did then proceed to qualify ourselves for our Office of Elector by taking the oath prescribed by the Constitution of and Laws of our State, in the manner required by law, and to organize our Electoral College.

That William McKinley of the State of Ohio, was first in nomination for President of the United States of America, for the four years from and after the third day of March next ensuing.

That we then and there proceeded to vote ~~by~~ ballot in pursuance of the Constitution and Laws of the United States, for President of the United States, and in counting the ballot it was ascertained, that William McKinley, of the State of Ohio, had received eight votes for President of the United States <sup>of America</sup> and that no other person was voted for.

We further certify that Theodore Roosevelt of New York was then and there was first in nomination for Vice-President of the United States, for the four years, from and after the third day of March next ensuing.
