basins, wharves, locks, waste weirs and outlets, and also any other body of water bed or impounded by dams, canals, or other artificial means.

Fines: how payable.

SEC. 6. *And be it enacted*, That all fines in this Act are payable, except as provided in Section 8 of Chapter 293 of the Acts of 1896, one-third to the informer and two-thirds to the County Commissioners of said county to be by them accredited to the fund for the payment of bounties provided in Sections 18 and 19 of Chapter 276 of the Acts of 1902.

SEC. 7. *And be it enacted*, That any Acts or parts of Acts local or general, inconsistent with the provisions of this Act, be and the same are hereby repealed.

SEC. 8. *And be it enacted*, That this Act shall take effect from the date of its passage.

CHAPTER 373.

AN ACT to repeal Article 36, Section 28, of the Code of Public General Laws, title "Sheriff," sub-title "Fees for Delivering Commissions to Road Supervisors," so far as the same applies to Washington County.

Fees: Road Supervisors.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland*, That Article 36, Section 28, of the Code of Public General Laws, title "Sheriff," sub-title "Fees for Delivering Commissions to Supervisors of Roads," as applied to Washington County, be and the same is hereby repealed.

Duty of Clerk to County Commissioners.

SEC. 2. *And be it enacted*, That it shall be the duty of the clerk of the County Commissioners of Washington County immediately upon the appointment of any and all road supervisors for said county, after their respective commissions shall be made out and signed by the said County Commissioners, to mail to each road supervisor, so appointed, his commission to issue to his latest postoffice address or to deliver the said commission in person to the said road supervisor if that be the most direct method for the clerk of the said County Commissioners.

SEC. 3. *And be it enacted*, That this Act shall take effect from the date of its passage.
