SEC. 2. *And be it enacted*, That this Act shall take effect from the date of its passage.

CHAPTER 414.

AN ACT to repeal Section 3 of Article 57 of the Code of Public General Laws, title "Limitation of Actions," and to re-enact the same, with amendments.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland*, That Section 3 of Article 57 of the Code of Public General Laws, title "Limitation of Actions," be and the same is hereby repealed and re-enacted so as to read as follows: Limitation of actions.

3. No bill, testamentary, administration or other bond (except sheriffs and constables' bonds), judgment, recognizance, statute merchant, or of the staple or other specialty whatsoever, except such as shall be taken for the use of the State, shall be good and pleadable, or admitted in evidence against any person in this State after the principal debtor and creditor have been both dead twelve years, or the debt or thing in action is above twelve years' standing; provided, however, that every payment of interest upon any single bill or other specialty shall suspend the operation of this section as to such bill or specialty for three years after the date of such payment; saving to all persons who shall be under the aforementioned impediments of infancy or insanity of mind the full benefit of all such bills, bonds, judgments, recognizances, statute merchant, or of the staple or other specialties, for the period of six years after the removal of such disability. Pertaining to life of judgments, etc.

SEC. 2. *And be it enacted*, That this Act shall take effect from the date of its passage.

CHAPTER 415.

AN ACT to authorize the Board of Public Works to provide for the securing of broken bricks, crushed stone, plaster and other materials in the burnt district of Baltimore City, and to transport the same to the oyster beds in the Chesapeake Bay and its tributaries, in need of materials to replenish the shells and natural rock necessary for the growth of the oysters, and to provide for the transportation of the same from Baltimore City to the said oyster beds.

WHEREAS, Owing to the late fire in Baltimore City, there has accumulated a large amount of refuse, consisting of broken stone, bricks, mortar and other materials suitable for the accumulation of oyster spat on the oyster grounds of the Chesapeake Bay; and, Oyster spat.
