Which was read, assented to, and sent to the Senate.

Mr. Watkins, Chairman of the Committee on Ways and Means, to whom was referred the bill entitled an Act to prohibit the Clerk of the Circuit Court of Frederick county from issuing licenses to venders of spirituous or fermented liquors within three miles of the post-office at Hansonville, Frederick county, reported back the same, and asked to be discharged from the further consideration thereof, and recommended that said bill be referred to the Select Committee on that subject.
