REPORT.

The Committee on the Judiciary, to which was referred the Resolutions introduced by Mr. Koons, of Frederick, respectfully report that a petition embracing the same subject having been referred to this Committee and acted upon by it early in the session of this present House, and the effect and operation of the word "white" in the Constitution of this State having been substantially abrogated and annulled by the adoption of late amendments to the Constitution of the
