SEC. 147. The said President and Commissioners Appoint clerk may appoint a clerk, and prescribe his duties, and allow him such compensation for his services as they may think proper.

Sec. 148. All ordinances passed by the said President and Commissioners shall be entered by the clerk Ordinances in a book to be kept by him for that purpose; and said ordinances, or printed copies thereof, shall be kept for the inspection of any person interested.

SEC. 149. The said President and Commissioners shall have power to determine upon and regulate all wharves matters relating to the building of wharves in said town, and to regulate the mooring of rafts, arks, and boats on the waters of the Susquehanna River in front of said town.

Sec. 150. The proprietors of lots binding on and entitled to the privileges of the water in said town may, on water. subject to the rules and ordinances of said President and Commissioners, wharf out and extend and improve the whole front of their lots for such distance as from time to time they shall think proper; and they shall be entitled exclusively to such emoluments arising from the wharfage thereof, as may be fixed upon by the said President and Commissioners; but nothing contained in this or the preceding section shall prevent the owner of any wharf, erected in said town, from having the exclusive right to use, occupy Exclusive right and enjoy the same at pleasure.

Sec. 151. The said President and Commissioners shall have the power to pass ordinances, regulating Pass ordinance the market measurement and weight of all provisions sold in and to be consumed in said town; to suppress all disorderly meetings; to prevent firing guns, squibs or any kind of fire-arms or fire-works in said town; to suppress and abate all nuisance; to punish parties for exposing for sale or selling unsound provisions; to prevent tame ducks and geese from going at large; to prevent any immoderate driving driving or riding through the streets in any carriage, stage, cart, wagon or other vehicle, or on Lorseback so as to endanger the lives or limbs, or property of the citizens of said town, or disturb the quiet enjoyment of the streets and thoroughfares; to prevent the
