Mr. Brattan presented the petition of J. A. Horn and fifty other citizens and taxpayers of the town of Crisfield, protesting against the repeal of the charter of said town.

Which was read and referred to Messrs. Brattan, Tuck and Steiner.

Mr. Suit presented the petition of B. F. Duvall and others, citizens of Prince George's county, praying the repeal of section 5 of chapter 381 of the Acts of 1872, offering a reward for the destruction of hawks and owls, so far as the same applies to Prince George's county, for the reason that more than three thousand dollars have been levied during the past year for the destruction of such birds, which they believe have been mostly killed in other counties.
