time to time, made large appropriations for the support of St. John's College; and

Whereas, It is represented that there is great confusion and discrepancy in the accounts of said College, and that to the end that one of the Faculty should be relieved in the settlement of his accounts, the Visitors and Governors did mortgage the College and grounps; therefore—

Be it Ordered, That the Secretary of the Board of Visitors, be and he is hereby directed to furnish a statement of the entire indebtedness of the College—the amount of mortgages upon said College and grounds, and a copy of the accounts of any officer or officers of the College who is or has been in default during the past four years.

Which was adopted.
