that there were or might be to the amount of \$7,500, claims of parties furnishing supplies to the College Commons during the superintendence of Dr. Nelson, yet unpaid, which the Board assumed to pay, which thus, whatever be the exact amount within the above limit of \$7,500, constitutes a debt of the College, and for the payment of which, the Board proposed to provide by negotiating a loan, and securing it by mortgage on the real estate of the College. This indebtedness I omitted to state in my former communication.
