The salaries of the teachers of each county shall be fixed by the board of county school commissioners; provided, that no white teacher regularly employed in a public school of the State of Maryland, having an average attendance of fifteen pupils or more, shall receive as salary less than three hundred dollars per school year.

A teacher who has been wrongfully removed and holds herself in readiness to teach, is entitled to compensation if she was unable to obtain other employment. Underwood v. School Commissioners, 103 Md. 190.

All white teachers regularly employed, holding a first-class teacher's certificate and having taught for a period of three years in any of the public schools of the State of Maryland, shall receive as salary not less than three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350) per annum; and provided further, that if such teacher hold a first-class teacher's certificate and has taught in the public schools of Maryland for a period of five years, he or she shall receive an annual salary of not less than four hundred dollars (\$400); and provided further, that if a teacher holds a first-class teacher's certificate and has taught in the public schools of Maryland for a period of eight years, he or she shall receive as an annual salary not less than four hundred and fifty dollars (\$450); and provided, further, that if a teacher holds a second-class teacher's certificate and has taught in the public schools of the State of Maryland for a period of eight years, he or she shall receive as an annual salary not less than three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350). The county commissioners of each county shall levy a sufficient amount to meet the increase of salaries provided for in this section.

Section 122½ r of the act of 1908, ch. 635, held not to be invalid under article 3, section 29, of the state constitution. The duty of the county commissioners to levy taxes under said section, is enforceable by the county school commissioners by mandamus, and the right to the writ is not defeated by the appeal from the county commissioners provided by article 5, section 84. On or before the first day of October of each year the county superintendent shall submit to the county school board a list of all teachers employed, together with a classification of their certificates.
