The said judges of election shall certify to the commissioners the result of said election and declare the three condidates receiving the greatest number of votes duly elected, and said judges shall receive such compensation for their services as the commissioners may determine.

Said commissioners shall annually appoint a clerk, who may also be treasurer, and who shall keep the minutes of their proceedings in a well-bound book, which shall be open at any time to the inspection of any one interested. If said commissioners appoint the clerk treasurer, the said clerk shall give a bond in such sum as the commissioners shall deem proper, and shall pay out the money that shall come into his hands only on the order of the commissioners, which order shall plainly appear in the minutes.
