The said Mayor and Council of Rockville shall give at least three weeks' notice by publication in some newspaper printed in the Town of Rockville, of the time and place of holding such primary election, and shall appoint, at least one week prior to the time for holding such election, three persons to act as judges of such election, which judges shall be subject to the same provisions of law as are judges of town elections. Ballots of the same form and arrangement as those used in town elections shall be furnished by the Mayor and Council of Rockville for each primary election and shall contain the name of each person who shall file with the Clerk of the Mayor and Council of Rockville at least ten days prior to the time for holding the primary election by which he seeks nomination, notice in writing of his desire to be voted on at such election, of the office for which he wishes to become a candidate and the party with which he is affiliated.

The Mayor and Council shall have power to provide by ordinance for the conducting, regulating or controlling of primary or town elections in any respect not covered by the specific provisions of this Act.

799. The council shall meet at some convenient place in said town on or before the first Monday in June next succeeding their election, and as often thereafter as may be necessary to discharge the duties of their office, not less, however, than once in every three months.

The Mayor shall preside at all meetings, and shall call such meetings from time to time as he may deem necessary; but in the event of the absence of the Mayor at any meeting the members of the council present shall elect one of their own members to preside during his absence, who shall, for the time being, be clothed with all the powers and authority of said Mayor. A majority of the council shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and the council shall pass rules and by-laws for their own government while in session.

The council shall annually appoint a clerk, who shall also be treasurer, who shall keep minutes of its proceedings in a well bound book, which shall be open to the inspection of all persons interested therein, and shall discharge such other duties as the council may require; and said council shall also annually appoint a bailiff and such under-bailiffs and other officers as may be deemed necessary. They may also, if it is deemed expedient, appoint a supervisor of streets.
