

## SNOW HILL.\*

**295.** The inhabitants of Snow Hill, Worcester County, Maryland, are hereby made and declared a body corporate by the name of the "Mayor and Council of Snow Hill," and by that name shall have perpetual succession and may sue and be sued, use a common seal, and possess such powers and privileges and incidents as may attach by law to a municipal corporation, may purchase or hold real, personal and mixed property and may sell or dispose of the same, including any and all right, title and interest of the Mayor and Council of Snow Hill in and to the existing electric light plant and system, consisting of the real estate, power plant, distribution and transmission lines, meters, appliances, fixtures, rights, appurtenances, privileges, franchise or franchises and any other physical property constituting or used in or about said electric light plant and system or any part or parts thereof, if in the discretion of the said Mayor and Council of Snow Hill any sale or sales thereof shall be for the benefit of the said town, and provided any sale or disposition of said electric light plant and system and franchise or franchises therefor shall be approved by the Public Service Commission of Maryland.

**296.** The government of said town shall be vested in a Mayor and three Councilmen, to be selected as hereinafter provided, who shall be taxpayers and qualified voters of said town twelve months next preceding their election, and that their term of office shall be two years or until their successors are elected and qualified.

**297.** The taxable and corporate limits of said town shall begin at a point on the Pocomoke River, north forty-six degrees west from the (north) corner of a bridge on the county road leading to Newark, said bridge being north twenty and one-half degrees east from the west corner of the residence of James Burroughs and being over a ditch called the Tax ditch; thence south forty-six degrees east to the west corner of said bridge; thence running the following courses and distances, to wit: South thirty-nine degrees east, one hundred and thirty-six and one-half poles to the county road leading from Snow Hill to Patty's bridge, where the line between the Burroughs and Morse lands intersects said county road; thence south twenty-one degrees west, eighty-six poles to a wild cherry tree; thence continuing same course forty-three and one-half poles to a persimmon tree; thence south twenty-five degrees west one hundred and thir-

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\*Snow Hill has been authorized to issue bonds as follows: 1896, ch. 122, \$18,000 for water supply; 1904, ch. 388, \$15,000 for street improvements; 1908, ch. 355, \$6,000 for street improvements; 1908, ch. 56, \$18,000 of refunding bonds; 1920, ch. 491, \$20,000 for light plant, subject to referendum.
