Upon complying with the provisions of the foregoing section, the plaintiff may thereupon claim in his declaration, either together with any other demand which may be enforced in such action, or separately, a writ of mandamus commanding the defendant to fulfill any duty, in the fulfillment of which the plaintiff is personally interested, or directing the defendant to do any act or acts that he may be bound by contract with the plaintiff to do, or an injunction forbidding the defendant to do, repeat or continue to do any act or acts that it is his duty to refrain from doing, either by contract or otherwise, or either or both of said writs.

The pleadings and other proceedings in any action in which a writ of mandamus or injunction is claimed shall be the same in all respects, as nearly as may be, and costs shall be recoverable by either party as in an ordinary action at law; and the defendant may demur to so much of the plaintiff's declaration as claims such writ, and such demurrer shall raise the question whether the facts stated as the ground of such claim disclose any such legal duty as that so sought to be enforced, but shall be subject to all rules governing general demurrers at law, both as to the proceedings thereon and thereafter.
