by him for that purpose, and shall be at all times open for the inspection of any person interested, and copies of all ordinances shall be put up in the most public places of said village.

- 12. The corporate bounds of said village shall be as follow: Beginning at the west corner of the Rising Sun school house lot, and running thence north eighty-five degrees east ninety-two perches, thence south seventy-two and a half degrees east eightythree seventy-two one-hundredths perches, thence south fortytwo and a half degrees west one hundred and sixty-seven seventy-six one-hundredths perches, thence north nineteen degrees west seventeen twenty-four one-hundredths perches, thence north eighty-five and a half degrees west sixty thirty-six onehundredths perches, thence north forty-seven and two one-tenth perches, thence north six degrees east seventy-five forty-four one-hundredths perches to the place of beginning; and the property within said limits shall be subject to such taxes and assessments as may be deemed necessary by said commissioners, · or a majority of them, to support and maintain the expenses that may be incurred in the improvement of said village.
 - 13. All fines and forfeitures under the ordinances of said corporation, may be recovered as small debts are recoverable before any justice of the peace.
 - 14. The said commissioners, or a majority of them, shall have power to make all such by-laws and regulations, as shall not conflict with the laws and constitution of the State of Maryland, and shall also have power to pass ordinances regulating the market, the inspection, measurement, and weight of all provisions, grain, and wood, sold in said village; to suppress all disorderly meetings; to prevent firing cannon, guns, squibs, or any kind of fire-arms or fire works in said village; to suppress and abate all nuisances; to prevent stock of all kinds from running at large; to prevent any immoderate driving through the streets with carriage, stage, cart, wagon, or other vehicle, or on horseback, so as to endanger the lives, limbs, or property of the citizens of said village, or disturb the quiet enjoyment of the streets and thoroughfares; and to prevent the parading and indecent
