

## HOLLY GROVE.

1870, c. 457 enacts the following:

194. The clerk of the circuit court of Baltimore county, Maryland, shall not grant a license to any person to sell spirituous or fermented liquors of any kind at any place within one mile of Holly Grove, Baltimore county, Maryland, and any person selling any spirituous or fermented liquors, or any other kind of intoxicating drink, whether of original manufacture or of a mixed character, within the above described limits, shall, on conviction, be subject to the same fines and punishments now provided by the Code of public general laws of Maryland, for selling spirituous or fermented liquors without license.

Approved and in force April 8, 1870.

## JUSTICES OF THE PEACE AND CONSTABLES.

The act of 1870, c. 37, approved and in force February 19, 1870, authorizes and empowers the governor to appoint an additional justice of the peace in the fifth election district of Baltimore county.

The act of 1870, c. 117, approved and in force March 23, 1870, authorizes the county commissioners of Baltimore county to appoint an additional constable for district number "five" in said county.

The act of 1870, c. 244, approved and in force April 7, 1870, enacts as follows: The governor is requested to appoint an additional justice of the peace for the eleventh election district of Baltimore county.

## LIVE STOCK.

1870, c. 265 adds the following:

195. It shall not be lawful for any person to allow swine to run at large in any part of Baltimore county which lies within the distance of fifteen miles from the bounds of Baltimore city.

196. Any person may impound any swine found going at large in any part of said county not distant from the bounds of Baltimore city more than fifteen miles, belonging to any inhabitant thereof, and the owner of such swine, on reclaiming the same, shall pay at the rate of twenty-five cents per head for every twenty-four hours such swine may have been im-
