all the public ground, between the market-house and school-house, and between the school-house and Gay street, and ten feet of ground immediately contiguous to the west side of said market-house, through from Market street to Gay street, is vested in the said president and commissioners and their successors; *provided*, they shall not erect thereon any other than public buildings for the use of said town; the house over the market-house, which was built by the members of Washington lodge, number fifty-nine, of Free and Accepted Masons, shall revert to, vest in and belong to the master, wardens and members of Temple lodge, number one hundred and twenty-eight, of Free and Accepted Masons, who shall have immediate possession of the same, they and their successors forever.

Bailiff to collect
taxes.

70. Immediately upon the receipt by him of the book specified in a preceding section, the bailiff shall proceed to collect all taxes levied by the said commissioners, and shall pay over the same, whenever required so to do by the said commissioners, to the treasurer of said corporation. And if any person shall

neglect or refuse to pay said taxes, or shall neglect or refuse to pay any fines or forfeitures levied or imposed by the said commissioners, the bailiff shall proceed to collect said taxes, fines or forfeitures by distress or execution as county taxes are collected; and in order to enforce the payment of said taxes, fines or forfeitures, the duties and powers imposed and conferred on the collectors of county taxes by the eighty-first article of the code of public general laws of this state, and its several supplements and amendments are imposed and conferred on said bailiff in as full and ample manner as if the several provisions of the said eighty-first article of the code of public general laws and its supplements and amendments relating to the collection of county taxes, were herein expressly enacted.
