25. Whenever the board of police commissioners for the city of Baltimore, or the sheriff of any county, shall call out any portion of the militia to aid in preventing threatened disorder or opposition to the laws, or in suppressing riot or disorder on election days, or at any other times, as provided by law, said military force shall be deemed to be on detached service, while under the orders of the said board or sheriff, and the commanding officer thereof shall not be subject to the orders of any superior officer whatsoever, except the commander-in-chief.

26. Out of the volunteer uniformed organizations already existing and those hereby created, there shall be formed a body of active militia, to consist of not more than thirty-eight companies, and to contain not more than twenty-two hundred and eighty enlisted men, to be enlisted, organized and maintained as hereinafter provided, to be known as the "Maryland National Guard," and to be located and distributed throughout the State, as follows:
