**133.** The name of Secretary creek, a branch of the Great Choptank river, in Dorchester county, is changed to Warwick river, and the name of Cambridge creek is changed to Cambridge harbor.

**CRUER.**

**134.** The crier of the circuit court shall be entitled to and receive a *per diem* of three dollars for each and every day he shall be employed as such, which shall be in full and in lieu of all other allowances now authorized by law; and the commissioners are authorized and directed to levy annually, for the use of the crier of said court, on the assessable property of said county, such sum of money as they shall deem sufficient to pay his *per diem*, for both the general and equity terms thereof; and upon presentation to said county commissioners, of the certificates of the clerk of said court, certifying the number of days in which he has been engaged at each term of said court, he shall be entitled to receive his *per diem* in cash; and the said county commissioners are directed, upon presentation thereof, to pay the same.

**135.** No allowance shall be made in Dorchester county for the head of any crow killed in said county.

**136.** The provisions of sections 241 to 245, of article 4, of the public local laws, title "City of Baltimore," relating to "Cruelty to Animals," shall apply to Dorchester county as fully as if repeated in this article.

**137.** Dorchester, Cecil, Carroll, Caroline, Calvert, Kent, Montgomery, Prince George's, Queen Anne's, St. Mary's, Somerset, Washington, Wicomico, Worcester and Allegany counties, and
