178. It shall not be lawful to haul a seine of any description whatever in the waters of the Choptank river and its tributaries, within the borders of or jurisdiction of Dorchester county, for the purpose of catching fish, from the first day of May to the first day of July in each and every year.

Any person violating the preceding section, upon conviction thereof before a justice of the peace residing in the counties of Dorchester, Caroline or Talbot, opposite the shores where the offence is committed, shall be fined not less than ten dollars nor more than twenty-five dollars for each offence, to be collected in the same manner and by the same process of law as other fines or small debts are collected.
