65. The citizens of the town heretofore known as Huntington, in Prince George's county, are constituted a body corporate by the name of "The Commissioners of Bowie," and by that name may have perpetual succession, sue and be sued, and have and use a common seal.

66. The limits and extent of said town shall be the same as laid down and platted on the official plat of Huntington as filed and recorded in the office of the clerk of the circuit court for Prince George's county.

67. The said board of commissioners are empowered, whenever requested by a majority of the legal voters within the limits of the proposed extension, to extend and enlarge the limits of said corporation, by having the contemplated extension surveyed and the bounds thereof established, a copy of which survey shall be recorded among the records of the corporation.

68. The legal voters of the town, who have resided therein for the space of six months next preceding the election, shall elect by ballot, on the first Monday in April in each and every year, at such place as may be designated by the board of commissioners, three commissioners of the town, who shall have resided within the limits of the same at least one year next preceding the election, and who shall be property holders within said limits.

69. All elections shall be held and conducted as shall be directed by the laws of the corporation, not inconsistent with the provisions of this charter.

70. The commissioners so elected, at their first meeting after said election, shall choose one of their number as president of the board, whose duty it shall be to preside at their meetings, to
