The sum of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars is hereby appropriated to be paid by the State treasurer upon the warrant of the comptroller, on the first day of August, 1902, and annually thereafter, and to be expended, or as much thereof as may be necessary, for the purchase of text books, as provided in section 64. The whole of said sum shall be apportioned by the comptroller in the month of July of each and every year, according to and based upon the total number of different pupils enrolled, as disclosed by the statistics of the report of the State board of education for fiscal year ending July 31, 1901, and he shall immediately thereafter notify the treasurer of the several boards of county school commissioners of the counties and the city of Baltimore of the amount thus found to be due to each, and the same shall be paid to the treasurer of the board of school commissioners of Baltimore city and the several counties, upon the draft of the president and secretary of the several boards of county school commissioners and the city of Baltimore aforesaid.

It shall be the duty of the county examiner to examine candidates for the profession of teacher, in the presence of at least one member of the board of county school commissioners, or one or more of the district trustees, and to give to such persons as are found qualified, under the sanction of the board at its next meeting, a certificate setting forth the branches such persons are competent to teach; but no certificate shall be granted without satisfactory evidence of the moral character of the applicant.

The certificate issued by each county superintendent shall be numbered and registered in a book kept by the board of county school commissioners, and be delivered to their successors in office, and shall be denominated first or second grade, as the case may be, and the state board of education shall keep a book in the same manner as the county superintendent; certificates of the first grade shall embrace orthography, reading, writing, arithmetic, geography, United States history, English grammar, bookkeeping, algebra, natural philosophy, physiology, plane geometry (four books), general history,
