said justice of the peace shall, on the sixth day thereafter, enter judgment of condemnation against the boat, tackle, nets, or other equipments of such offender which had been seized by the officer aforesaid, which said boat, tackle, nets or other equipments shall, after ten days' notice, be, by the said officer, sold to the highest bidder for cash, and from the proceeds of such sale shall deduct the fees allowed constables upon executions, the costs incident to such trial and judgment, together with such expense as such officer may have incurred in the taking and keeping of such property, and shall then divide the residue between the informer and the schools of the county equally, said officer not to be liable for any damage or loss of said property while in his custody which may occur without fault on his part.

Enter judgment.

How disposed of.

Sec. 6. And be it enacted, That if any person or persons convicted of offending against any of the provisions of this act shall think himself aggrieved by such conviction, he or they may appeal from the judgment of the justice of the peace before whom such conviction is had, at any time within ten days from the rendition thereof, to the circuit court of the county in which the trial was had. If any resistance be made to the officer directed to execute this act by any person or persons offending against the same, the said officer shall summon the posse commitatus and proceed therewith without delay to execute his duty under such warrant. The justice before whom such offender or offenders shall be taken shall have full power to issue summons for all witnesses that be named to him, to compel their appearance and examine them under oath.

Right of appeal.

SEC. 7. And be it enacted, That all acts or parts of acts inconsistent with this act be and the same are hereby repealed, and that this act shall take effect from the date of its passage.

Inconsistent acts repealed.
