

## CHAPTER 22.

AN ACT to repeal section two of chapter ninety-five of the Acts of Assembly of Maryland of 1858, entitled "An Act to Incorporate the Maryland Club," passed February 24, 1858, and re-enact the same with amendments.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland,* That section two of chapter ninety-five of the Acts of Assembly of Maryland of 1858, entitled "An Act to Incorporate the Maryland Club," passed February 24, 1858, be and the same is hereby repealed and re-enacted, so as to read as follows: Repeal.

SEC. 2. *And be it enacted,* That the said corporation shall have the power of receiving subscriptions, donations, devises and bequests of property, real, personal, mixed, or of any interest therein, and of purchasing, leasing, or otherwise acquiring such property for the uses of said corporation, and of selling, pledging, mortgaging, or otherwise disposing of the same, and of ratifying any disposition of property by it heretofore sold, pledged, mortgaged, or otherwise disposed of. Power

Provided, however, that the total clear net value of the property held by said corporation, shall not at any time exceed five hundred thousand dollars. Proviso.

SEC. 3. *And be it enacted,* That this act shall take effect from the date of its passage. Effective.

## CHAPTER 23.

AN ACT to amend and perpetuate the charter of the Young Men's Christian Association of Baltimore.

WHEREAS, "The Young Men's Christian Association of Baltimore" was incorporated on the 29th day of December in the year eighteen hundred and fifty-three, under the General Laws of Maryland, acts of 1852, chapter 231, which was recorded among the charter records of the City of Baltimore in Liber E. D., No. 1, Folio 350; and the same was amended in the year 1860 and recorded among said records in Liber G. E. S., No. 5, Folio 188; Preamble.

AND WHEREAS, said corporation has established Branch Associations, and has occasion to enlarge its Board of Directors and have its corporate existence perpetuated and its powers increased; therefore, Preamble.
