

Basement of State House. ment of the State House and annex thoroughly cleaned, and all books and records therein of value to be stored in proper places of deposit ; and such books and papers as said board, after due examination, shall not deem worthy of preservation it shall cause to be sold, and the proceeds of such sale shall be paid into the treasury of the State.

Furniture. SEC. 4. *And be it enacted,* That the said board of public works is hereby authorized to have the furniture and hangings of the Executive Chamber repaired or replaced with new furniture and hangings in such manner as it may deem necessary for the comfort of the occupants thereof.

Secretary of Board of Health. SEC. 5. *And be it enacted,* That the secretary of the State Board of Health be and he is hereby directed to act with the said Board of Public Works in all matters mentioned in the preceding section of this act which have reference to the ventilation and sanitary condition of the State House or any part thereof, and the building referred to and provided for in this act which is to contain said water-closets.

Appropriation. SEC. 6. *And be it enacted,* That fifteen thousand dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary be and it is hereby appropriated to carry out the provisions of this act.

Effective. SEC. 7. *And be it enacted,* That this act shall take effect from the date of its passage.

CHAPTER 247.

AN ACT authorizing the treasurer to pay to the personal representative of the late John S. Gittings, deceased, the amount of a bond or bonds, certificate or certificates, which the State has called for redemption, and which is claimed to have been lost.

Preamble. WHEREAS, it appears from the dividend books, that two thousand dollars of the State debt were issued under chapter 302 of 1837, to the late John S. Gittings in trust, and that interest has been regularly paid thereon to him or his personal representatives.

Preamble. AND WHEREAS, John S. Gittings, administrator *de bonis non, cum testamentum annexo*, of the late John S. Gittings, deceased, claims that the State's bond or bonds, certificate or certificates, for said sum has been lost or misplaced, and
