title "Crimes and Punishments," sub-title "House of Refuge" be, and the same is hereby repealed and re-enacted so as to read as follows:

353. The estate and concerns of said corporation shall be managed and conducted by the twenty-four managers of Managers whom ten shall be elected by the members of the associa-Refuge. tion, and ten appointed by the mayor and city council of Baltimore and four shall be appointed by the Governor in the month of February annually.

SEC. 2. And be it enacted, That this act shall take effect effective. from the date of its passage.

CHAPTER 397.

AN ACT to add an additional section to article twentyseven of the Code of Public General Laws, titles "Crimes and Punishments," sub-title "Railroad Obstructing," to follow section two hundred and thirty one and to be known as section two hundred and thirty-one A.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That an additional section be and the same is hereby added to article twenty-seven of the Code of Public sections General Laws, title "Crimes and Punishments," sub-title "Railroad Obstructing," to follow section two hundred and thirty-one, and to be known as section two hundred and thirty one A.

231 A. Any person who shall cling, climb, jump, step or in any other way get upon any part of any locomotive, Riding on engine or car, whether the same be freight, passenger, coal lawfully or otherwise, upon any part of the track of any railroad within this State, unless in so doing they act in compliance with law, or any permission under the rules and regulations of the railroad company or corporation operating and managing such railroad, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof before any justice of the peace or any court of competent jurisdiction shall be fined not less than one dollar nor more than twenty-five dollars or be subject to imprisonment in jail or in the Maryland House of Correction for not more than six months, or to both fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the justice of the peace trying the case, or court before whom the case may be tried, or if such person be a minor under sixteen years of age, he may in the discretion of the justice of the peace.
