sheriff of Baltimore City, shall be paid to the mayor and city council of Baltimore, and out of said fines the judge of how dissaid court may order and direct to be paid to the State's Baltimore Attorney for said city such additional fees in cases of extraordinary duration and trouble, as he may deem just and reasonable, but this section shall not have any effect upon the rights of informers.

SEC. 2. And be it enacted, That this act shall take effect Effective. from the date of its passage.

## CHAPTER 412.

AN ACT to repeal and re-enact, with amendments, section 38 of article 8 of the Code of Public Local Laws of Maryland, title "Cecil County," sub-title "Birds and Game."

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Maryland, That section thirty-eight of article eight of the Code of Public Local Laws, title "Cecil County," sub-title "Birds and Game," be repealed and re-enacted, with amendments, so as to read as follows:

Amend-

SEC. 38. It shall not be lawful to shoot, trap or kill, or in any manner destroy or expose for sale any partridge or when unrabbit in Cecil County, between the tenth day of January lawful to and the twentieth day of November, and in Harford County tridges and between the twenty-sixth day of December and the fifteenth rabbits in Cecil day of October; nor any Woodcock between the first day county. of January and the tenth day June in either of said counties; nor any rail birds, or pheasants, between the first day of February and the fifth day of September in each year, in Cecil County; nor any rail birds or pheasants between the first day of February and the first day of September in each year in Harford County; and the possession of any of the birds or game mentioned in this section during the prohibited periods shall be deemed prima facie evidence against such persons of a violation of this section, except when it may appear that such birds or game are for breeding purposes.

SEC. 2. And be it enacted, That this act shall take effect Effective. from the date of its passage.
