CHAPTER 557.

AN ACT to repeal section 196 of article 93 of the Code of Public General Laws, sub-title "Guardians and Infants" not residing in this State and re-enact the same with. amendment.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That section one hundred and ninety-six (196) of article ninety-three (93) of the Code of Public General Laws of this State be and the same is hereby repealed and reenacted so as to read as follows:

196. If any non-resident infant shall be entitled to any legacy, bequest or distributive share, or to the proceeds of any sale made under a decree of a court of equity or to any of legacy any sale made under a decree of a court of a specific to non-money or personal property in the hands of a trustee appointed resident by will are shall be entitled to the proceeds of sale of property in this State or to any legacy, bequest or distributive share of any personal property in the hands of any administrator or guardian in this State, and such infant has a guardian regularly appointed in the State, district or territory of the United States in which such infant resides, such foreign guardian may obtain an order from the proper court for the payment, transfer or delivery of such proceeds, legacy, bequest or distributive share upon the terms prescribed in the next two succeeding sections.

SEC. 2. And be it enacted, That this act shall go into Effective. effect from the date of its passage.

CHAPTER 558.

AN ACT to appropriate certain sums of money to pay the claims of the Marr Construction Company of Baltimore City and the Schultz Gas Fixtures and Art Metal Company of Baltimore City.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the comptroller of the treasury be and he is hereby authorized and directed to issue his warrants upon the treasurer of the State for the sum of sixteen hundred and fifteen dollars and forty-two cents in favor of the Marr Construction Company of Baltimore City for wiring the State House, the comptroller's office and the treasurer's office for the introduction of electric lighting and for the
